#### New Testament Reading: Romans 8:31-39

<sup>31</sup> What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? <sup>32</sup> He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? <sup>33</sup> Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. <sup>34</sup> Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. <sup>35</sup> Who will separate us from the love of Christ? # In Flanders' Fields by John McCrae

In the spring of 1915, shortly after losing a friend at Ypres, a Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae wrote his now famous poem after seeing poppies growing in the battle-scarred fields.

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place: and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe;
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high,
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow

## Benefice Bulletin for 9th November 2025

I can't recall accurately when it was that I became aware of a possibility that Remembrance Sunday might cease to be kept. Maybe in the 70's or 80's? It didn't happen, of course. On the contrary, Remembrance Sunday has got bigger and bigger. At Deddington, when I was Vicar there early this century, the Remembrance Sunday service was the best-attended of the whole year and, in the course of my time there, there was some impressive research leading to a new war memorial being placed in the Church which included names omitted from the old memorial. Nowadays in very many communities at this time of year Tommy statues will appear in churchyards and other public spaces. There doesn't seem any appetite to stop Remembrance ceremonies these days and you might say that reverencing our war dead is the nation's most widely shared religious experience (one by no means exclusively Christian).

Some may feel a little concerned that on Remembrance Sunday the Christian Church so willingly embraces representatives of the armed forces and thus, in a sense, condones violence. However, there is a long and respectable Christian tradition of thinking of some wars being acceptable under certain conditions – Just War theory. It may be right sometimes to make war in order to put a stop to great evils, though one wonders whether any large-scale war, though pursued for ends we might feel just, has ever entirely avoided unjust acts being perpetrated by those who have felt right was on their side.

The emphasis of today's Christian services, in any case, is on the victims of violence, concern for whom is surely a thoroughly Christian sentiment. And the language of sacrifice spoken in these services, resonates, of course, with the sacrifice of Christ, himself a victim of violence. That emphasis persuades me that Remembrance services are not really condoning - let alone *sanctifying* - the world's violence; rather, central to these services is a celebration of the love than which there is none greater, that embodied in laying down one's life for one's friend, a sacrifice which many service personnel will have made in conscious imitation of Jesus. Such sacrifices are indeed to be honoured.
