

Collect & Readings for Second Sunday of Advent Collect

O Lord, raise up, we pray, your power and come among us, and with great might succour us; that whereas, through our sins and wickedness we are grievously hindered in running the race that is set before us, your bountiful grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit, be honour and glory, now and for ever.

Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 11:1-10

- ¹ A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.
- ² The spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord.
- ³ His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord.

He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear;

- ⁴ but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked.
- ⁵ Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.
- ⁶ The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them.
- ⁷ The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox.
- ⁸ The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den.
- ⁹ They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain;

for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

¹⁰ On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious.

New Testament Reading: Romans 15:4-13

⁴ For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. ⁵ May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, ⁶ so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁷ Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.

⁸ For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the circumcised on behalf of the truth of God in order that he might confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, ⁹ and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written, "Therefore I will confess you among the Gentiles, and sing praises to your name';

¹⁰ and again he says,

'Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people';

¹¹ and again,

'Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples praise him';

¹² and again Isaiah says.

'The root of Jesse shall come,

the one who rises to rule the Gentiles; in him the Gentiles shall hope.'

¹³ May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 3. 1-12

¹ In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, ² 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.' ³ This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, 'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight."'

⁴Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. ⁵ Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, ⁶ and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

⁷ But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸ Bear fruit worthy of repentance. ⁹ Do not presume to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ¹⁰ Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

¹¹ 'I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹² His winnowing-fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing-floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

Post Communion Collect:

Father in heaven, who sent your Son to redeem the world and will send him again to be our judge: give us grace so to imitate him in the humility and purity of his first coming that, when he comes again, we may be ready to greet him with joyful love and firm faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Almighty God, you sent your servant John the Baptist to prepare your people to welcome the Messiah. Turn our disobedient hearts to you, so that when Christ comes again to be our judge we may stand with confidence before his glory. Lord in your mercy. **Hear our prayer.**

Faithful God we pray for your blessing to be upon this congregation, upon the Church throughout the world and upon our Benefice. May your presence be seen vividly in what we do and say each day. We pray that your joy and your love will flow freely in and through us and that we might never be perfect examples of your love in action.

Lord in your mercy. Hear our prayer.

Creator God, with axe and winnowing fork you clear a holy space where hurt and destruction have no place, and a little child is King. Clear the trouble spots of our world from hatred and despair and sow seeds of joy and peace so that shoots of hope may spring forth and all people, whatever their creed, race, colour or gender may live together in harmony with one another.

Lord in your mercy. Hear our prayer.

Merciful God, we remember all whose illness stems from a mental health issue, who often suffer in silence because of stigma and who reach out for help that is often not there because of stretched services. Help us to break through the ignorance that causes stigma and recognise that mental illness is as real as a broken leg or influenza and give them hope through patience and encouragement.

Lord in your mercy. Hear our prayer.

Loving God, we pray for those whose hearts have been saddened by the death of someone close and dear to them, for members of our families who have died and whose anniversary we recall. Help us to experience the comfort of the Holy Spirit within us, and the fellowship of the Church family around us until we are reunited once more in your heavenly kingdom.

Lord in your mercy. Hear our prayer.

Glorious God, source of joy and righteousness, enable us as redeemed and forgiven children evermore to rejoice in singing your praises. May what we have sung and spoken with our lips become strong belief in our hearts and what we believe in our hearts become our way of life, throughout this Advent and in the years to come.

Merciful father: accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen

Benefice Bulletin for 7th December 2025

I've had a number of favourable comments about the Book of Common Prayer Holy Communion last Sunday. One factor generating that response may have been the different liturgy, which perhaps engaged people's attention more than a wholly familiar one

I suspect another factor was the music. The Choir was on fine form (congratulations to them and particularly to David Wright), the new organ sounded impressive (many thanks, Jenny and Chris Saunders!) and the larger than usual number of people present enhanced the singing (and maybe the conversation after the service).

There are down sides to Benefice services, though. Not everyone is able or willing to make the journey to a church outside their village, so we have a lower level of church attendance overall. The reduction in services at one's home church and consequent reduction of money coming in through collections have been commented on as have the financial consequences of giving away Benefice service collections to speakers from charities. Having two Benefice services in a row is not comfortable for some. I don't, however, sense great discontent at the current arrangement and it would be possible to mitigate at least some of the difficulties.

What the Benefice services haven't done is ruin our finances. I'm delighted to be able to say that we shall have the money in the bank, when the last regular instalments of parish payments have been made later this month, to pay in full the Share the Diocese has asked from us. Many thanks to all who have helped this to happen and a particular thanks to our Treasurers who have kept tabs on the figures for us, and have, I suspect, suffered a degree of anxiety when it has seemed we would fall short. (If any of you are going on with my pound-a-day-till-Christmas suggestion, don't stop!)

Next year we shall again make the whole – albeit higher - Share because we are genuinely seeking to do God's will and God honours this commitment, but it may be proper to reconsider the proportions of the Share each parish is currently paying.

This financial success is all the more notable given the loss of income to the Benefice resulting from the Let's Shine Festival, which took away energy from Benefice fundraising. That loss didn't ultimately matter because we were doing a very good thing which God honoured. The planning for this year's Festival is now quite advanced and a Let's Shine Community Fund committee has been brought into being to disburse monies accruing from the first Festival to charitable causes; it will shortly be possible for applications to be made (via the website:

https://www.letsshinetogether.co.uk).

So, a lot of good news. Sadly, though, we have to mourn Will Adams, highly-respected and much-loved former Rector of Astwell. Please remember him, Linda, Jim, Kate and all the family in your prayers.
